Captions can be downloaded and the transcript offers a search function.</p> <p>Overview: This video features Caren Grown, Global Director for Gender at the World Bank Group, discussing the gender dimensions of poverty.</p> <p>She defines gender as the social construction of male and female roles and norms, which significantly impacts access to resources and responsibilities, making women more vulnerable to poverty. Grown highlights key areas of gender inequality contributing to poverty, including:</p> <p>Labor markets: Women often face lower earnings and predominate in informal, precarious employment.</p> <p>Access to assets: Women frequently lack ownership of critical productive resources like land and housing due to inheritance patterns and market structures.</p> <p>Time poverty: Women bear a disproportionate burden of unpaid care work for children, the elderly, and the sick, compounding their economic vulnerability.</p> <p>She also touches upon the challenges in data collection, as household-level data often obscures individual women's experiences of poverty. The video concludes by outlining policy responses, emphasizing a multidimensional approach that includes leveraging digital technology (addressing the gender digital divide), ensuring food security for women farmers, building care infrastructure, and extending legal economic equality to women globally.</p>
